






# Berry Bowls

## SHAPE & FUNCTION



They're not meant to be very large!

Can do double duty as a colander!







**TIP:** Make sure the bowl slopes to a low point at the centre of the bottom and place a hole there to ensure complete drainage!

**Purpose**  
To store fresh berries and other fruit, allowing drainage after washing and air flow to prevent spoilage

**TIP:**


A foot (or feet) on the bowl is important for complete drainage and 360° air flow.

## Hole Patterns



## Saucers

- Saucers are commonly paired with berry bowls, and are a nice add for catching the last bit of water as it drains, but aren't necessary
- Throw a matching saucer; it's just a plate with a slightly raised rim
- Use calipers or a ruler to ensure the saucer's inside width fits the foot of the bowl



## Tips For Cutting Holes

- Cut holes once bowl is firm enough to trim.
- Remember shrinkage when making holes. Leave at least 1-1.5 cm between holes and the rim.
- Use hole cutters if possible; fettling knives, pin tools or any thin hollow tube can be used to pierce the bowl.
